### **Much, Many Mucho, Muchos/as**

Usamos **many** para cosas que podemos contar, y **much** para cosas que no podemos contar:

My father has **many trees**. Podemos contar trees: 1 tree, 2 trees, etc., por eso decimos **many**.

Pete doesn't do **much work**. No podemos contar work, por eso decimos **much**.

Pete doesn't do **many days** of work. Podemos contar days: 1 day, 2 days, etc., por eso decimos **many**.

Es fácil saber cuándo decir **much** y cuándo decir **many**, porque **sólo decimos many con palabras que son plurales**. La mayoría de las palabras plurales terminan en -s: birds, houses, libraries. Solo hay pocas excepciones como children, que es una palabra plural pero no termina en -s.
